Course Selection




The course selection due date was extended to give students last weekend to complete them. Course selection should now be complete online in the student portal

Congratulations KSS / KLO Wrestlers!

Keaton Burgess a grade 8 student at KLO Middle School and Bryson Burgess a grade 12 student at Kelowna Secondary both wrestled there way to the podium at the recent BC School Wrestling Championships. The Championships were held at the Pacific Coliseum in Vancouver from February 24 - 26, 2022.

Wrestling his first match ever Keaton opened the tournament with a 14 - 4 loss against Leon Tsuboi of Queen Margaret School. He was them pinned by Karanjot Ghillon of Tamanawis Secondary School. Keaton then when on to defeat his next two opponents. He first pinned Patden Ismay of GidGalang Kuyas Naay Secondary School and then defeated Justin Rip of Collingwood School by a score of 14 - 4. Those two wins won Keaton the Bronze Medal in the 38kg weight division.

While competing in the 57 kg weight division Bryson opened the tournament with a quick pin at 15 seconds of the first period over Cole Neilson of Spectrum Community School. Bryson also pinned his next opponent Clarence Brion of Gladstone Secondary School at 1:18 of the first period. Bryson lost his third match while being pinned by Evan McLeod of Alberni District Secondary School. In his fourth match of the tournament Bryson pinned Riley Jhuty of Matthew McNair Secondary School at 1:25 of the first period. In his final match Bryson lost by a score of 10 - 0 against Mostafa Addo of Princess Margaret Secondary School. Those results left Bryson in 4th place out of the twenty wrestlers in a very competitive weight division.

K-12 Rapid Test Kits

K-12 Rapid Test kits, approved by Health Canada, have been provided to schools for distribution to families. In a recent bulletin from Health Canada, the British Columbia Centre for Disease Control has updated information about the safety and proper use of the test kits. As a result of the recent Canada Health Public Advisory stating that the rapid antigen tests kits and solutions are to be kept out of the reach of children, elementary and middle schools will be coordinating for parent/guardian pick-up of the test kits. KSS has distributed their Rapid Tests Kits to students during their block 1-2 class on January 24th. If students did not receive their Rapid Test Kits they can now pick them up from the KSS office during office hours 8:30 am – 4:00 pm.

This is a brand-new introductory construction safety training course created by the BC Construction Safety Alliance (BCCSA). The program will focus on BC safety regulations but is being built so it can be adapted for use across Canada.

This online training program replaces the popular Construction Safety Training System (CSTS-09) we previously offered, which close to 75,000 BC construction workers have completed. For many BC employers, a SiteReadyBC certificate will become mandatory for all new employees upon first entering a construction site.

Successful students will receive certificates to both the SiteReadyBC program and WHMIS-2015.

No internet access? Please contact your school and they will assist you with the online application.

PLEASE NOTE: The application process is online only, no paper enrollment is available. You are required to have a valid email account.

Applications will be assigned a date-time stamp on a first-come, first-served basis, which will factor into a student's placement priority.

Complete the online application as early as possible, and provide the required documents listed below directly to the school by email by Friday, March 18, 2022.

- 1. Student's Birth Certificate or other government issued proof of age and citizenship.
- 2. Proof of Parent/Guardian B.C. Residency
 - a. Combination BC Driver's License and Services Card (copy of both sides); or,
 - b. BC Services Card (copy of both sides) and one item from the list of supporting documentation that follows; or,
 - c. Proof of application for BC Medical Services Plan and one item from the list of supporting documentation that

3. Proof of Parent/Guardian Living Address/Supporting Documentation

- Ownership of a dwelling or long-term lease or rental of a dwelling;
- Documentation indicating British Columbia residence (i.e. utility bill); British Columbia registration of an automobile;
- British Columbia Driver's License (copy of both sides); or, A current income tax return filed as a British Columbia resident.

AFTER Thursday, September 1, 2022

New in-catchment area enrollments: Parents will be notified by a confirmation email when the school has accepted the student's application for enrollment. Board Policy 405R - Student Placement (Regulations), will be used to determine student placement and priority.

New out-of-catchment area enrollments: Parents <u>may not</u> be notified until after the summer enrollment period is over and all in-catchment area students have been placed.

Qualifying age: The School Act requires that a child must be five years of age by December 31, 2022 to qualify for school enrollment in September 2022. No exceptions.

Create a Netlink ID

Once you've applied, create your Netlink ID at <u>unicca/netlink</u>. This will become your @uvicca email address while you're a student. You'll also use your Netlink ID to access the UVic student portal where you'll self-pert your grades, apply for scholarships and register for your courses.

Submit supplemental information

Prepare your supplemental information (if required) and submit it by your program's supplemental application deadline. This is usually January 31 or earlier. You can find these requirements and deadline on your program's page at <u>unic.cal/programs</u>.

Submit proof of English language proficiency

If your first language isn't English, submit proof of English language proficiency by February 28 or the deadline indicated in your application checklist. uvic.ca/enpr

Self-report your grades between February 15 and March 15

Self-report your interim grades or predicted IB scores via the link in the checklist in the UVic application portal. uvic.ca/application
By self-reporting your grades, you will be automatically considered for entrance scholarships based solely on your calculated admission average. You must self-report your grades to be considered for admission or scholarships at UVic.

A parent's/guardian's guide to the cancellation of the French Immersion 12 Assessment for the 2021/22 School year (l'Évaluation de littératie de la 12° année – Français langue seconde – immersion (LTF12))

Background and what occurred

British Columbia's French Immersion programme allows students to earn dual diplomas, receiving both a British Columbia Certificate of Graduation (Dogwood Diploma) and a Diplôme de fin d'études secondaires en Colombie-Britannique. In order to graduate with both diplomas (often referred to as Dual Dogwoods), French Immersion students must meet specific course requirements, and also write provincial assessments in Literacy 10 and 12 (English), Numeracy 10 (English or French), and l'Évaluation de littératie de la 12º année – Français langue seconde – immersion (LTF12). The LTF12 assessment has two distinct components: an oral component and a written component. The oral and written components are administered at different times. The French Immersion Literacy 12 assessment (l'Évaluation de littératie de la 12º année – Français langue seconde – immersion) was scheduled for first administration in January 2022.

Over the past few months, grade 10 and 12 provincial assessments have been impacted significantly by work force capacity issues and the ability to address technical issues within the electronic assessment system. The capacity issues for the Ministry and e-assessment service provider teams have been exacerbated as of late by COVID-19 Omicron variant. Due to these ongoing impacts, the Ministry made the difficult decision to cancel the January administration of all grade 10 and 12 provincial graduation assessments. Approximately 1000 French Immersion students took the oral component of LTF12 in the four days before the January session was cancelled. No students have taken the written component, which was canceled along with all other assessments

A decision was subsequently made to maintain the April 2022 and June 2022 sessions for all graduation assessments except for l'Évaluation de littératie de la 12e année – Français langue seconde – immersion (LTF12).

Why is the LTF12 Assessment cancelled for 2021/22?

The decision of when to provide courses taught in French for French Immersion students is scheduled at the school level, and in many cases all courses in French are completed in the first semester of the grade 12 year, or occasionally even in grade 11. As many French Immersion students do not have the opportunity to use French beyond their courses, it is of most benefit to students that they take the LTF12 assessment as soon after completing all their French courses as possible. In addition, if students are not currently taking any courses in French, they do not have access to teacher support in preparing for the LTF12 assessment.

Due to the language loss concern for those who have completed all their French language courses by January (which is approximately 59% of all French Immersion students), the Ministry of Education does not expect this group to write LTF12 in any further sessions offered in the 2021/22 school year. Requiring some students to write the assessments and not others based on when courses are offered would create inequity and therefore, in fairness to all students, the decision has been made to cancel LTF12 for this school year and to provide all Grade 12 French Immersion students in 2021/22 with an exemption for this assessment.

The Ministry recognizes the hard work French Immersion students put into their course of study and that the cancellation of the LTF12 assessment for this school year is not ideal. As well, those students who completed the oral component prior to the January cancellation may feel that their efforts are not valued. However, after discussion with various groups, including Principals and Vice Principals and French Immersion teachers, it was

decided that providing an exemption for all students was the best solution, providing the greatest fairness to students.

All students who successfully complete their graduation requirements (other than LTF12) will receive Dual Dogwoods.

With the decision to cancel l'Évaluation de littératie de la 12e année – Français langue seconde – immersion (LTF12) for the 2021/22 school year, all students who successfully complete their graduation requirements (both course work and graduation assessments other than LTF12) this school year will be granted the Dual Dogwoods

What Assessments do French Immersion Students require in 2021/22?

Along with their course requirements, French Immersion students must complete the following graduation

- Literacy 10 (English)
- Numeracy 10 (English) or l'Évaluation de numératie de la 10^e année (French)
- Literacy 12 (English)

It is important to note that the cancellation of the LTF12 assessment (l'Évaluation de littératie de la 12° année – Français langue seconde – immersion) is for the 2021/22 school year ONLY and that this assessment will be a requirement for Dual Dogwoods for the 2022/23 school year and subsequent school years.

What about Post-Secondary Institutions?

Consultation and discussions with post-secondary institutions confirm that admissions will not be impacted by the cancellation of the LTF12 assessment (l'Évaluation de littératie de la 12e année – Français langue seconde – immersion) and the exemption provided to graduating French Immersion students for this assessment.

Kids Miss School due to Dental Problems

Each year kids miss valuable school days due to dental problems. Dental problems will interfere with a child's concentration in school and ability to enjoy extra-curricular activities. Research supports that children with good oral hygiene, and regular dental care, miss less school due to dental problems, and have better adult oral health.

Basic dental overage is available for children through The BC. Healthy Kids Program. Eligibility criteria for the Healthy Kids Program is based on eligibility for Medical Services Plan (MSP) Supplementary Benefits. Children are eligible for up to a maximum of \$2,000 towards basic dental services every two years. This includes:

Fluoride X-rays Fillings Extractions

How to access services under the BC Healthy Kids Program?

To use services under the BC Healthy Kids Program the parent or student can show the student's BC CareCard or BC Services Card to the dental provider. The dental office will confirm coverage with the program before each appointment. Before any services begin, parents need to check with the provider to see if there will be additional charges over what the BC Healthy Kids program will cover. It's not straws or plastic bottles. The most common form of plastic pollution is cigarettes.

Cigarette butts are the most abundant form of plastic waste in the world, accounting for over 766 million kilograms of toxic waste yearly. Cigarette filters break into smaller plastic substances leaching out some of the 7000 chemicals contained in a single cigarette which are especially harmful to water ecosystems. The problem is so big that it caught the attention of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and the World Health Organization (WHO), who formed a partnership to address

Tips for Parents in Supporting Their Students in Stressful Circumstances

This tip sheet is intended to help you as you support your child with the evolving situation in the Ukraine.

It is important to note that children will have a wide range of responses to the current situation. Some may not appear to be affected at all while others may be highly impacted.

Start by Listening:

- It is important to start by asking how children are doing and then listen carefully to what they say. We can't assume we know what they are thinking and feeling. What they are actually thinking and
- feeling might surprise us.
- Ask open ended questions to encourage children to elaborate. Ie, How are you feeling? What are
- your thoughts?
 Watch for signs of fear and anxiety that children may not be able to put into words. Je. changes in normal behaviour or functioning.

Validate and Normalize:

- Let them know you heard their concerns. Je 'Sounds like you are feeling worried.' 'I hear you when you say you are scared.
- Let them know that what they are feeling is ok and normal under the circumstances. Je. 'It makes sense that you would be worried right now. Lots of people would react that way in this situation.' 'You are having a normal reaction to a very abnormal event.'

Encourage Empathy and Compassion:

- Remind children that there may be others who are very impacted by this situation. Le students who come from the Ukraine, Russia, or neighbouring countries.
- Encourage children to be especially kind and gentle with others who may not be feeling their best.


Address Fear:

- Remind them that they are safe in Canada. Let them know that the adults in their lives will continue to do their job of keeping them safe.
- Remind them that even though the current situation is very worrisome, that war always comes to an end and this one will too.
- Remind them that there is good reason to hope that this situation will end soon and that the Ukraine will be able to rebuild and regain their normal life.

Provide Factual Information:

- Give children the basic facts that are developmentally appropriate.
- Ask them what they already know so you can correct any misinformation they may have heard.
- Keep the information simple. It is not helpful to dwell on the situation or details. This will increase fear and anxiety.





- Immigration Canada is urgently processing applications for people of the Ukraine to immigrate to Canada
- Immigration Canada is extending permits for Ukranian people to stay in Canada who are already here.
- The government of Canada and many Canadian organizations are sending humanitarian aid to the people of Ukraine.
- Encourage students to find a practical way to help or donate.

Limit Information Exposure:

- Encourage students to limit the amount of time they spend on social media. Using social media will only increase fear and misinformation.
- Encourage them to limit the amount of information they take in even from reputable media
- Encourage them to limit the amount of time they spend discussing the situation with peers. This can create unnecessary drama and stress.

Maintain Normal Routine:

- Structure and normalcy during stressful times and unusual circumstances is very important for students.
- Acknowledge the situation and then get on with the normal activities of the day.

Model Calm:

- It is important that the adults model a sense of calm and security. We can acknowledge that we are affected by the situation too, but we must do so in a measured and controlled manner.
- Our children will take their cues from us. If we are calm and hopeful, it will be easier for them to be too.
