Grads of 2022!



Before the May 20th issue of Whoo's News reaches you, the prom will be well underway at Stuart Park. Tickets are no longer for sale but remember, the promenade is open to anyone.

Update:

The promenade starts at 6pm sharp, so you should arrive at the Dolphins statue at 1200 Water Street around 5:40pm.

The promenade will be led by our two grad presidents starting at the footbridge, followed by the grad council, and then grads and their partners can fall in. Grads are welcome to walk in pairs or groups of three. Prepare for delays as grads stop for photos.

We will walk over through the Island Stage walkway, NOT the boardwalk. Families and spectators are welcome to gather on the grass throughout the park or along the walkway leading to Stuart Park.

Grads must be at Stuart Park, ready to enter the event space, no later than 7pm. Grads must have photo ID to enter. There are no paper tickets as we have a list of "ticket" purchases and food orders.

KSS administration, teachers and security personnel will be on-site as well as first aid.

The KSS Code of Conduct will be in place for the entire event.

Please keep an eye on weather forecasts, and be prepared with umbrellas. Let's hope they are not needed!



June 4-5 Grad Stage-Crossing Information

2022 KSS Grad Information

Graduation:

The time has come to register for your June 4-5 walk across the stage at Kelowna Secondary School. Please follow this link: https://signup.com/go/JdZZSMV.

Some things to note:

- If you must alter your time, please be sure to cancel your original spot so that it opens up for other graduates.
- If you are booking a spot for your graduate, please confirm that they have not already signed up on their own.
- Use the email address that you check most often.
- Please do not book more than one spot unless you have two graduates.
- Please sign up using your graduate's preferred last name, then first name.
- Each graduate may bring 6 guests
- These stage-crossings will be recorded by a professional production company and released in full alphabetical order with valedictorian speeches on June 24. It will then be available to view for years ahead.
- Grads have the opportunity to sign up with their friends, but within those groups, they will cross the stage alphabetically.

<u>Valedictorian</u> - Both applications and nomination forms for valedictorian can be found outside room 193 this week. All applicants and nominees will undergo a rigorous interview and speech presentation process, and the finalists will be chosen by a panel of graduates and KSS staff. Applications are due to Ms. Culham in room 193 at 3:30pm this Friday, April 29, and nomination forms are due at 3:30pm on Thursday, April 28. The successful candidates will be announced at the prom on May 20.

<u>Prom</u> - After we released our exciting prom information last week, we received a handful of questions, which we will answer below. Our parent and staff committee has worked hard since November to create an event that is unique, safe, inclusive, and affordable while providing a formal celebration that our graduates deserve. KSS would like to thank those involved and those who have since volunteered to make this night a reality.

Q. Is this event prepared for adverse weather?

A. Yes. We have booked large marquis tents with sides to protect from rain. As weather during the month of May in Kelowna can be unpredictable, graduates should be prepared with umbrellas and sunscreen.

Q. Can my graduate's date from outside of the KSS graduating class walk with them on the promenade?

A. Yes! Anyone can participate in the walk; however, the size of our graduating class prevents us from accommodating outside guests for the prom event. We understand that this is unfavourable news for some, but it is an unavoidable result of having the largest graduating class in B.C.

Q. Does my graduate have to attend the prom in order to participate in the promenade?

A. No. All graduates are included in the promenade, and if they choose to celebrate in their own style with their dates, friends, or families, they will simply follow to the end of the promenade and exit once they reach Stuart Park.

Q. Is the cost of food included in the ticket price?

A. Yes! We have arranged for local food trucks to provide dinner and dessert for our grads, with a variety of vegetarian, vegan, and gluten-free selections. When grads purchase their tickets in-person on May 3, 4, and 5, they will have the chance to select their options then so that the companies can be prepared for our orders. We have purposely selected food options that will not lead to ruined formal-wear.

Q. Can the grads purchase additional food?

A. Unfortunately not. Stuart Park is part of the Sawmill Trust, which means that no commerce can take place on-site.

Q. What does the ticket cost include?

A. The \$65 ticket covers dinner, dessert, beverages, rental of the venue, security, fencing, DJ, decorations, tables, chairs, tents, and a professional photobooth and roving photographer.

Q. What about students who cannot afford the ticket?

A. The goal of the Spring Fling on April 13 was so that proceeds could go toward ensuring that any graduate whose attendance at the prom would be prohibited by cost would have an opportunity. Please contact dayna.culham@sd23.bc.ca for more information.

Q. Will there be a coat check?

A. Event organizers will not take responsibility for graduates' belongings. There will be tables and chairs on which to leave belongings and roving security, as well as parental supervision.

Q. Will there be washrooms?

A. Yes! While we do not have access to public washrooms, we have arranged for porta-potties that will be gender-neutral and which will allow ample space for large dresses.

NEXT STEPS FOR UVIC APPLICANTS

FROM HIGH SCHOOLS IN CANADA 2022

Thanks for applying to Canada's top comprehensive university—the University of Victorial This is your chance to study at a globally recognized research university, get hands on experience, and live and learn in our extraordinary environment. Use this checklist to keep track of the next steps to becoming part of the UVic community. If you have any questions, email us at recruitment@uvic.ca. We hope to see you in September!

Create a Netlink ID

Once you've applied, create your Netlink ID at uvic.ca/netlink. This will become your @uvic.ca email address while you're a student. You'll also use your Netlink ID to access the UVic student portal where you'll self-report your grades, apply for scholarships and register for your courses.

Submit supplemental information

Prepare your supplemental information (if required) and submit it by your program's supplemental application deadline. This is usually January 31 or earlier. You can find these requirements and deadline on your program's page at unic.ca/programs.

Submit proof of English language proficiency

If your first language isn't English, submit proof of English language proficiency by February 28 or the deadline indicated in your application checklist. uvicca/enpr

Self-report your grades between February 15 and March 15

Self-report your interim grades or predicted IB scores via the link in the checklist in the UVic application portal. uvic.ca/application
By self-reporting your grades, you will be automatically considered for entrance scholarships based solely on your calculated admission average. You must self-report your grades to be considered for admission or scholarships at UVic.

Apply for on-campus housing between February 7 and May 1

Hoping to live on campus? Apply between February 7 and May 1 at <u>uvic.ca/residence</u>.

Apply for specific-criteria application awards

You can apply for specific-criteria application awards (based on grades and merit) as of February 15. You can apply before you've received an admission offer, but make sure to submit your application before the deadline of April 30. uvic.ca/entrancescholarships

Accept your offer!

We'll send your offer of admission by email. Be sure to read all information carefully and pay the acceptance deposit by the deadline specified in your offer. Doing so will reserve your seat at UVic and enable you to register for classes, uvic.ca/admitted

Apply for a study permit, if required

If you're not a Canadian citizen or permanent resident, apply for your study permit as early as possible to allow for processing time. You can apply for your permit at <u>canada.ca/immigration</u>. You must pay your acceptance deposit before you can receive a study permit letter from UVic. uvic.ca/admitted

Register for courses

Watch your email between late May and early June for registration information including when to log in to find out your registration date and time.

Send final grades to UVic

Send your final official grades plus any other requested documents by the deadline listed in the UVic application portal <u>uvic.ca/final-grades</u>

- · completed secondary school with a high school diploma,
- completed the course requirements for the degree to which they were offered admission
- maintained the level of academic standing upon which the offer of admission was made.

Supporting students through their next steps

Vancouver students

Vancouver students are assigned an individual Enrolment Services Advisor (ESA) who will personally introduce themselves by email shortly after the May 1st admissions acceptance deadline. For questions about degree planning and courses, students should connect with their faculty's academic advising office.

Okanagan students

Okanagan students are supported by a <u>Student Services team</u> who can help with a full suite of topics ranging from student loans to academic advising. To connect with a member of the Okanagan team, students can call, email or book an advising appointment online.

Registration deposit deferral for Indigenous applicants

If a student self-identifies as an Indigenous person of Canada in their UBC application, their registration deposit will be automatically deferred. This is part of UBC's effort to support students who are being funded by third parties, including their band or Nation. 

Summary: What to Do When Sick

If you have symptoms of illness, stay home.

Most people don't need testing for COVID-19. Use <u>BCCDC Self-Assessment Tool</u>, or connect with 8-1-1 or your health care provider to find out if a COVID-19 test is recommended.

Symptoms of COVID-19 include:

Fever or chills
Cough
Loss of sense of
smell or taste

Difficulty breathing Sore throat Loss of appetite

Sneezing Extreme fatigue or tiredness Headache

vomiting Diarrhea

Body aches

Nausea or

Go to an emergency department or call 911 if you:

- Find it hard to breathe
- Have chest pain
- · Can't drink anything
- Feel very sick
- Feel confused

If you have MILD SYMPTOMS

Runny nose

(or have tested negative) STAY HOME.

For most people, testing is not recommended.

Mild symptoms can be managed at home.

If you TEST POSITIVE: SELF ISOLATE

- 1. Complete an online form to report your test result
- 2. Manage your own symptoms
- 3. Let your household contacts know

Return to School/Work

Stay home until you feel well enough to return to your regular activities.

If you are fully vaccinated OR less than 18 years of age

You can end isolation and return to school/work when all conditions are met:

- At least 5 days have passed since your symptoms started, or from test date if you did not have symptoms.
- Fever has resolved without the use of feverreducing medication, such as acetaminophen or ibuprofen.
- 3. Symptoms have improved

You should avoid non-essential visits to higher risk settings such as long-term care facilities and gatherings for another 5 days after ending isolation.

If you are 18 years of age or older AND not fully vaccinated

You can end isolation and return to school/work when all conditions are met:

- At least 10 days have passed since your symptoms started, or from test date if you did not have symptoms.
- Fever has resolved without the use of fever-reducing medication, such as acetaminophen or ibuprofen.
- 3. Symptoms have improved.

If you still have symptoms

Continue to isolate longer if you still have a fever or are not feeling better. If you are unsure or concerned connect with your health care provider or call 8-1-1.

What to do if someone is sick in your household:

You can continue to attend school if someone in your household is sick and/or self-isolating as long as you do not have any symptoms of illness and feel well. This includes if they have tested positive for COVID-19. Ensure you closely monitor yourself (or your child) for symptoms of illness and stay home if you feel unwell. The best way to protect yourself and your family from COVID-19 is to get vaccinated. Vaccines are available for anyone ages 5 and up. Register now at:
